# News from The Harbour Environment Officer

At April's Harbour Advisory Group meeting Louise MacCallum updated us on the following subjects.

## Stranded Dolphin.

The bottlenose dolphin that stranded in the north of the harbour in October 2014 died from Meningoencephalitis—an infection of the brain caused by bacteria or a virus.

#### **Eastney Point**

Work was on going in April to remove abandoned tenders and other vessels illegally placed above the high water mark. Two of the vessels were 'recycled' by being moved to be cleaned up, painted and installed as part of a free play area in Paulsgrove.

#### **RSPB** Islands

Electric fencing and new signs have been installed on the islands ready for the 2015 breeding season. The shingle added to the islands last year is still in place and has spread a bit so that there is now an attractive area for the terns to breed. Sandwich terns arrived in March and common and little terns at the end of April.

#### **Eclipse Observations**

Those watching the seabirds at the oyster beds on 20th March hoping to discover how the birds would react to the eclipse were frustrated by the cloud cover . There was no measurable changes in behaviour. Louise commented "It is hoped that observations in the colony during the next solar eclipse (12th August 2026) might yield more marked results!".

# **Hermitage Stream Restoration**

The Hermitage Stream is probably the main stream feeding into Langstone Harbour. It runs down from the Queens Inclosure at Cowplain to Bedhampton.

Many years ago—probably in the 50s—many of its 'reaches' at the lower end were canalised as a misplaced flood protection measure. More enlightened considerations 15 years ago led the Environment Agency to naturalise the reach between Middle Park Way and Stockheath. This stretch of the stream is now an attractive area with much improved biodiversity without increasing flood risk.

More recently proposals have emerged for similar restoration of the reaches north and west of Middle Park Way but after two years nothing has been done.

Now the charity 'Groundwork' is spearheading initiatives to get the project off the ground among other things using a 'Friends of the Hermitage Stream'. FoLH have been asked to consider helping and the committee will shortly do so.

# The Hayling Ferry

On 31st March 'The News' reported that the Ferry was up for sale with the erstwhile operators entering administration.

This is really bad news for the students and others for whom it was their daily trip to school or work. It's also bad news for us (FoLH) who rely on it as a key element in our annual walk round the harbour.

There have been difficulties for some years over the funding of the ferry linked to some extent by the costs the Harbour Board needed to recover for maintaining the Hayling jetty to the standard necessary for a public ferry operation. Funding and operation of the ferry is a transport matter and as such does not fall within the remit of the Harbour Board. The ferry was once subsidised by the Portsmouth and Hampshire Councils. When Portsmouth withdrew their subsidy funding became a constant problem.

Hampshire CC have been in contact with potential new operators so it is possible that the ferry may operate again. But our walk in September remains in jeopardy!

### Coastal and shore path erosion

We have previously reported on the damage done last year to the shore paths and the Billy Trail.

So far the only area that has been tackled is the path round South Moor where the Environment Agency have managed decent repairs of the damaged sections.

The southern part of the Billy Trail continues to erode but as we noted before this is not a public right of way and none of the local authorities have a responsibility to maintain it.
